

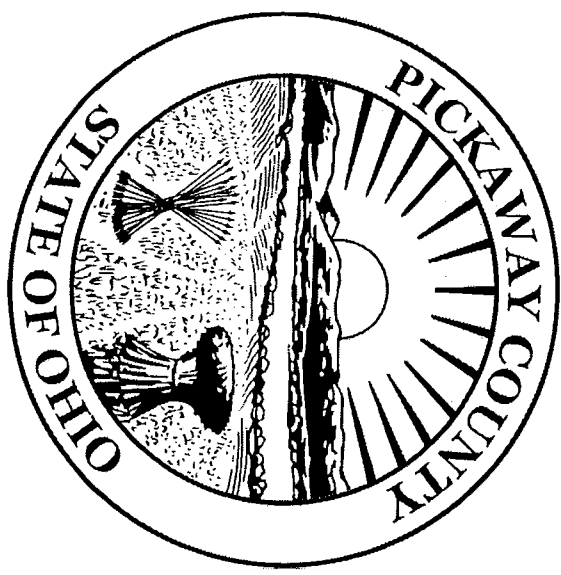

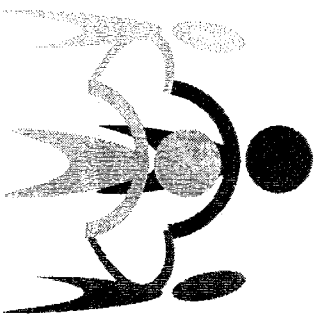
Family Treatment Court

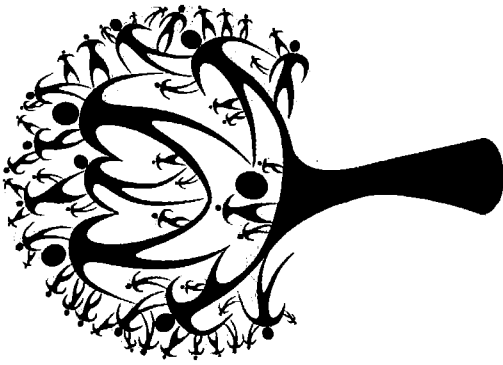
Family Treatment Court is designed to provide intensive support to parents working recovery and who wish to reunite with their child(ren).

What We Do

Family Treatment Court is a drug treatment program that is supervised by the court. Family Treatment Court is for parents 18 years or older who are involved with Children Services (CPS) and have been identified as having a substance use disorder which has created an inappropriate environment for their child(ren). The program provides quick access to treatment options in addition to intensive support and services, with the goal of reunifying families quickly.

How do I participate?

Candidates can notify their CPS caseworker, legal counsel, or call the Family Treatment Court Coordinator. A referral will automatically be sent to the Family Treatment Court Coordinator when CPS files a complaint in court when substances are a concern in the CPS case.

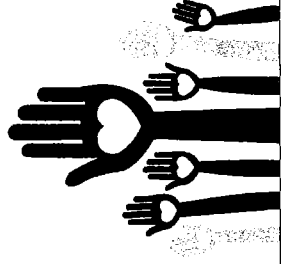
Conditions of Family

Treatment Court

Upon acceptance into Family Treatment Court, participants are expected to adhere to the following terms and conditions:

- Participate in treatment
- Refrain from using drugs
- Refrain from possessing any mood altering substances
- Submit to random drug screens
- Attend all required counseling sessions
- Appear for regularly scheduled status hearings
- Cooperate with CPS caseworker
- Comply with all rules of the treatment plan and program

Failure to comply may result in sanctions or dismissal from the Family Treatment Court.



Program length

Family Treatment Court is a three phase program that lasts a minimum of nine months. Remember: The goal of Family Treatment Court is to get your child(ren) back quickly while continuing to have intensive support and monitoring.

Phase 1

Lasts 90 days, with weekly status court hearings. *Specific objectives must be met in this phase, as well as all other phases, which will be explained to you in detail by the Family Treatment Court Coordinator.*

Phase 2

This length is individualized, yet typically lasting 12 weeks. At this phase participants can achieve unsupervised visits or reunification if they have complied. Court status hearings move to a bi-weekly schedule.

Phase 3

The final phase of the program; lasting approximately 12 weeks. Participants continue to parent their child(ren) while being monitored by the court. Court status hearings are scheduled once every three weeks.
